- ✓ Follow the work of other groups a combined approach is often better


















2. Organisational Options (Ian Morris)

Appendix 1

Foreshore Interest Group - Our Coast		
Committee Type	Description	Summary
Coastcare	Coastcare Victoria is a state-wide program run by the Department of Environment Land Water and Planning (DELWP). It is a little like the Landcare model. Coast care programs need to be approved by the relevant land manager and aimed at addressing specific coastal issues. To establish a Coastcare group would require the Group carrying out quite a lot of preliminary work to establish a clear purpose for the Group, agree an area and a structure of the Committee. The Group would need to eventually be incorporated and have a constitution generally consistent with the model rules under the Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012.	This option does provide a structure and the ability to communicate/network with other similar groups. There is currently a group being formed at Clifton Springs. Contact person is Matt Crawley of the Bellarine Catchment Network
Volunteers/Friends/ Interest Group	This would be a less formal structure and reliant on an agency/land manager to provide support and some form of direction. It could be incorporated or merely meet and act in support on some issue. There is currently a volunteer group being established by Bellarine Bayside Foreshore Committee of Management (BBFCM). This group of volunteers are being trained to beach and foreshore monitoring.	Regulatory issues such as Workcover, OHS and Public Liability would need to be under the umbrella of an agency
Community Group	This model may be similar to the Port Fairy Group which as I understand is an Incorporated Body established to pursue more effective coastal management and management of degraded or contaminated coastal land.	Member of this group attended our last workshop and have offered to assist further if required.
A subcommitte of an existing group	This could involve identification of an existing Community Group with common issues which is already incorporated and developing an action plan and seeking authority to pursue specific issues.	This would involve negotiations with another group and ensuring there is compatibility and common interest of the purpose of subcommittee area of interest and other issues.
